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PREFACE

The National Study of Protective, Preventive, and Reunification Services Delivered to Children and Their Families, 1994, has been given to the National Data Archive on Child Abuse and Neglect for public distribution by Westat, Inc. under authorization of Penny Maza of the Children's Bureau. Funding for the project was provided by the Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Administration for Children, Youth and Families, contract #105-90-1601.

ABSTRACT

The passage of the Adoption Assistance and Child Welfare Act of 1980 (P.L. 96-272) significantly reoriented child welfare services from a system which focused on foster care placement to one which was intended to provide the services necessary to maintain children in their own homes. In response to the provisions of the law, state and county child welfare agencies developed new social service programs and sought new avenues for coordinating with other components of the human service delivery system.

The purpose of the National Study of Protective, Preventive, and Reunification Services Delivered to Children and Their Families, 1994, is to provide a reliable national picture of the children and families in the "new" child welfare system. The study is designed not only to describe the current delivery system in terms of the number and characteristics of the children and families served by service type, but also to examine how agency, service, and client characteristics relate to case status.

The dataset consists of three files. The main case file includes 2,109 observations and 1,205 variables. It includes information about the number, types and services provided to children and their families, with an emphasis on differences in annual and point-in-time data, case duration, in-home and out-of-home services, race and kinship care. Two additional files are provided to separate out the repeating records. These files augment the main case file and contain 11,335 observations and 25 variables about household members and their characteristics and delineation of children receiving services.

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I. STUDY OVERVIEW

The current chapter of this User's Guide contains excerpts from the final report for the National Study of Protective, Preventive and Reunification Services Delivered to Children and Their Families. The final report was produced in 1996 by Westat, Inc. in association with James Bell Association. The report includes detailed information about the study background, design, and findings; It is available from the NCCAN National Clearinghouse on Child Abuse and Neglect (Phone: 800-FYI-3366, E-mail: nccanch@calib.com). Researchers may also be interested in obtaining a copy of the Sample Design and Analysis Appendix for the 1994 National Study. The document includes information about the sample design, the generation of the weights and design considerations for future studies. The Appendix also includes the estimates, standard errors and confidence intervals for data presented in the final report. Background

It has been almost 20 years since the 1977 National Study of Social Services to Children and their Families was conducted (Shyne and Schroeder, 1977). Since then, major changes have taken place in federal legislation, state policies and procedures, family demographics, and society in general. The passage of the Adoption Assistance and Child Welfare Act of 1980 (P.L. 96-272) began to change the focus of child welfare services from a system which emphasized foster care placement to one which was intended to make reasonable efforts to maintain children in their own homes or return children home as quickly as possible if foster care placement was necessary. In response to the provisions of the law and through their own initiatives, states and county child welfare agencies developed new social services programs and sought new avenues for coordinating with other components of the human services delivery system to increase client access to needed services. States began to focus greater attention on identifying, assessing, and serving the needs of families and making a transition from a child-centered approach to one that was family-centered.

In 1993 Congress again passed major child welfare reform legislation to focus service delivery on maintaining children in their own homes. The Family Preservation and Family Support provisions of P.L. 103-66 and the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 (OBRA 1993), provided a substantial boost to the development and enhancement of family preservation and family support programs in the United States.

Concurrent with legislative and programmatic changes, however, changes also occurred in the characteristics and needs of the children and families served. In the period between the passage of P.L. 96-272 and OBRA 1993, the number of abuse and neglect allegations rose dramatically as did the prevalence of other associated problems. In 1984, 1,727,000 children were reported as abused and neglected (28 per 1,000 children). By 1993 this number had risen to 2,890,234 (43 per 1,000) (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, 1995). In addition, other problems worsened during this time period such as homelessness, crack/cocaine addiction, and the number of single parent households. From 1980 to 1994, the proportion of families headed by a single parent increased from 22% to 31% From 1980 to 1992, the number of births to unmarried teens rose from 27.6 per 1,000 females to 44.6 per 1,000 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1995).

Despite the evolving focus of child welfare policies and procedures away from foster care placement, both the increase in the number of abuse and neglect reports as well as the complexity and severity of the problems experienced by children and families, overwhelmed the capacity of child welfare agencies which were already experiencing problems in recruiting, training, and retaining qualified staff. Furthermore, there was no reliable national picture of the children and families in the "new" child welfare system, the types and duration of services provided them, or the appropriatness, timeliness, or outcomes of such services. The National Study of Protective, Preventive and Reunification Services Delivered to Children and Their Families (1994 National Study) was designed to address these issues.

Purpose of Study

The 1994 National Study had two major objectives. The first objective was to describe the 1994 national data on the number, types, and services provided to children and their families, with emphasis on differences in annual and point-in-time data, case duration, in-home and out-of-home services, race, and kinship care. The second objective was to assess changes in the number, characteristics and percentage of children and families receiving services since the 1977 National Study.

The study was used to answer questions such as:

- How do the data on annual service delivery compare to the point-in-time snapshot of service delivery?
- What child, family, and service characteristics are related to case duration?
- What characteristics are related to removing children from their homes versus providing in-home services to children?
- · Are there differences in service provision to children by race?
- What is the role of kinship care?

Sampling and Selection Information

The study utilized a two-stage stratified random sample design covering all 50 states and the District of Columbia. The first stage consisted of the selection of a sample of counties or cluster of counties called Primary Sampling Units (PSUs). The second stage involved the selection of cases within agencies providing protective, preventive and reunification services for children within the sampled counties.

First Stage

The 3,139 counties and independent cities in the 50 states and the District of Columbia constituted the first-stage sampling universe. The Census Bureau's latest County and City Data File (containing the variables which were needed for stratification and sample selection) served as the sampling frame. All counties and independent cities in the sampling frame were stratified by urbanicity into the following four categories:

- 1. MSA counties with at least one city with 200,000 or more in total population;
- 2. All remaining MSA counties plus other counties with a place (as defined by the Census Bureau) having 25,000 or more in total population;
- 3. Non-MSA counties with at least 5,000 persons under the age of 22; and
- 4. Non-MSA counties with at least 1,000 persons but under 5,000 persons under the age of 22.

Within each of the four urbanicity categories, counties were sorted by the ten Health and Human Services Administration regions. A total of 50 PSUs were selected, two certainty and 48 non-certainty PSUs. Additional PSUs were randomly selected as potential substitutes. In all, 44 PSUs participated in the study. The 44 PSUs included 49 counties.

Second Stage

Within each of the counties sampled, a selection was made of cases within public child welfare agencies providing protective, preventive, and reunification services to children and their families. Agencies were asked to provide two sample frames, one identifying all cases that were being serviced on March 1, 1994. The strategy to collect data on cases open at a point in time made it possible to obtain point in time data estimates allowing the comparison of the 1994 National Study to the 1977 National Study data. However, point in time data emphasize those children who move in and out of the system quickly. To correct for the limitations of point in time data, the 1994 National study was also designed to provide annual data on children and families served over the previous one year period from March 1, 1993 to February 28, 1994.

From the sampling frame (including all families who were receiving services on March 1, 1994 as well as all cases that had been open for some interval in the preceding twelve-month period), 2875 families were randomly selected. The sample included 2300 children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994 and 575 children whose cases had closed during the past 12 months. Allowing for a 15 percent attrition rate due to nonresponse, 2,500 cases were determined to be in scope for the study. However, following the cleaning of sample frames to identify duplication, misclassification, etc., only 2,109 telephone interview questionnaires were completed with caseworkers. 1,666 cases were receiving services on March 1, 1994 and 443 cases had closed during the past 12 months, resulting in an 84 percent response rate.

Data Collection

The collection of data involved a one-time telephone interview with agency caseworkers in the 49 county agencies. The interview (see Appendix A) took between 30 and 50 minutes to administer.

The interview format included two distinct components, a *Population*Characteristics Component and a Services Provided Component. The *Population*Characteristics Component was administered first and included questions relevant to case history; It elicited information required to estimate the number and types of services cases received over a one-year period. For this component of the questionnaire, workers were told to refer to the case record where necessary.

The Services Provided Component was administered second and included a series of screening questions aimed at determining which cases were still open as of March 1, 1994. For these cases, questions were asked to obtain information on current service delivery and case worker decisions over the past six months (March 1, 1994 -September 1, 1994). Interviews were conducted in the summer of 1994 so that questions pertaining to both time periods could be answered in a single interview.

II. DESCRIPTION OF MACHINE-READABLE FILES

The Archive distributes these data as SAS transport or SPSS portable files. Other file formats and subsets of the data can be prepared by special request. Please refer to the NDACAN order form or contact the Archive for more information.

The Archive distributes three data files for this study. A brief description of each file is provided below. For information regarding variables, please see Appendix B: Codebook Information and Appendix C: Description of Derived Variables.

List of Files and Characteristics

In each of the files below cases are uniquely identified by the variable TRCID.

PUBLIC

This main case data file contains 2109 observations and 1205 variables. This file contains one record per case. The unit of observation is the case. The file includes information about the number, types and services provided to children and their families, with emphasis on differences in annual and point-intime data, case duration, in-home and out-of-home services, race, and kinship care.

PUBLICR2

This data file contains 2481 observations and 11 variables. This file may contain more than one record per case. The unit of observation is the child. The file pertains only to question B2 of the questionnaire which asks, "In that case, I need the names of all the children in the case and their birthdates, who were receiving services between (START DATE) and (END DATE) in order of age, starting with the oldest. This includes other children who may have a different caseworker. What is the name of the oldest (next oldest) child receiving services?"

PUBLICR4

This data file contains 8854 observations and 14 variables. The unit of observation is the household member. The file pertains only to question C1 of

the questionnaire which asks about the members of the household. The file includes information about each household member's relationship to the primary child as well as birthdates.

Notes Regarding the Data Files

For all questions and all files, "8" and "98" = "unknown" (unless value labels state otherwise).

For all questions and all files, "9" and "99" = "not ascertained" (unless value labels state otherwise).

PUBLIC

- 1. The variables L10AYR and L10YR are duplicates.
- 2. The variable C1MO in the Derived Variables Addendum (Appendix C) is variable C1DMO in the data file.
- 3. The observations in this file may be linked to PUBLICR2 and PUBLCR4 on the basis of the variable TRCID.

PUBLICR2

- 1. The observations in this file may be linked to PUBLIC and PUBLICR4 on the basis of the variable TRCID
- 2. The variable B2BDAY has one out of range value: "52".

PUBLICR4

1. The observations in this file may be linked to PUBLIC and PUBLICR2 on the basis of the variable TRCID.

III. CONDUCTING ANALYSES WITH THE 1994 NATIONAL STUDY DATA

Important Weighting Information

The 1994 National Study data must be weighted in order to insure appropriate statistical inferences. The data in their raw form (i.e. the unweighted data) do not accurately represent population of interest.

Appropriate analyses of the 1994 National Study require the use of both full sample weights and replicate weights. Sample weights are required because the sampled elements were selected by unequal probability sampling methods (i.e. nonrandom selection). That is, sample weights correct for selection bias arising from overrepresentation of some cases that are more likely to be sampled and underrepresentation of some other cases that are less likely to be sampled. Sample weights are also needed in making adjustments for nonresponses.

Replicate weights are required because the data were collected in a multi-stage cluster design. One consequence of multi-stage cluster sampling is that observations can not be assumed to be independent as is commonly done for a simple survey. Observations that are from the same cluster will likely be more similar to each other than to observations from a different cluster. Replicate weights are used to take these factors into consideration and to allow researchers to generate unbiased estimates of variance and standard error. The reader may consult Cochran (1977) or Kish (1965) for a general discussion of sampling designs. Lee, Forthofer, and Lorimor (1989) provide a recent discussion of the use of weights with complex survey data.

As mentioned above, the appropriate weighting scheme for the 1994 National Study data arrives at weighted estimates of service delivery via a **full sample** weight variable. Additionally, the complex design structure is addressed via the corresponding **24 replicate weight variables** associated with each case. The replicate weights are necessary for producing unbiased estimates of variance and standard error.

The 1994 National Study Allows For Two Weighting Alternatives

All analyses of the 1994 National Study should make use of both full sample weights and replicate weights. Researchers have the option to choose between a set of full sample and replicate weights that were developed for conducting child level analyses, and a set of full sample and replicate weights that were developed for conducting family level analyses. The main data file, PUBLIC includes both sets of weighting variables.

The set of weights used for **child level** analyses includes the full sample weight, TPRWT, and the replicate weights, TPRWT1-TPRWT24. The child level estimates represent all children who were the main focus of service delivery. The second complete set of weights is used for **family level** analyses. These include TRIMWT as the full sample weight and TRIMWT1- TRIMWT24 as the replicate weights. The familiy level estimates represent case level data, including children and biological parents.

Special Software Is Required To Analyze The 1994 National Study Data

Many advanced statistical packages (e.g. SPSS and SAS) have a WEIGHT statement that enables the computation of unbiased population estimates. However, many of these packages cannot calculate accurate variance and standard errors of population estimates from studies based on complex survey designs such as the 1994 National Study. If one of the standard statistical packages (e.g. SPSS and SAS) is used for complex survey data like the 1994 National Study, then the resulting variances and standard deviations are incorrect, since these packages assume simple random sampling to calculate variance and standard errors. Several specialized programs for complex survey data are available that compute descriptive statistics and their associated sampling errors (Lee et al. 1989). Examples of these programs include SUDAAN, PC CARP, and WesVarPC. Although any of these programs, as well as other

¹ During the interview, caseworkers were asked to identify the children who were the main recipients of service delivery during the study period. If there was more than one child identified, one child was sampled for interviewing purposes. However, the child estimates represent all children who were the focus of service delivery. These children are referred to as the primary child or primary children.

suitable programs not mentioned, can be used for analysis of the 1994 National Study, NDACAN strongly encourages the use of the WesVarPC software.

WesVarPC is a user-friendly software package that runs in a windows environment. WesVarPC can be obtained free of charge via the Internet or on diskette. Internet users can find WesVarPC on Westat's home page on the World Wide Web (www.westat.com). Alternatively, users can contact Westat directly to receive WesVarPC on diskette (WesVarPC, c/o Maida Montes, Westat Inc. 1650 Research Boulevard, Rockville, MD 20850). The software comes with complete installation istructions and a user's manual.

The following chapters of this manual demonstrate how to conduct some analyses of the 1994 National Study data using WesVarPC.

IV. WESVARPC EXAMPLES: CHILD LEVEL POINT-IN-TIME ANALYSES

Importing the 1994 National Study File

Once WesVarPC has been installed, select the WesVarPC icon created during the installation process to run the program. To import the 1994 National Study File, select "Import Data File" from the Prep menu and identify the SAS transport file or SPSS system file. Once the file has been imported, all of the variables contained in the file should appear in the SOURCE VARIABLES box. These variables need to be moved into the other boxes on the screen as follows:

- Move the TRCID variable to the ID box.
- Move the TRPWT variable to the FULL SAMPLE box.
- Move the replicate weight variables (TRPWT1 24) to the REPLICATES box.
- Move the remaining variables (or variables of interest) to the VARIABLES box.
- Select JK2 in the METHOD box.

Once all of the variables have been moved and the model selected, click on the CREATE button to create a WesVarPC version of the File. WesVarPC will ask users to name the new data file and give the file a .var extension. Please note that the above procedure imports the dataset which is suitable for child level analyses only. If interest lies in conducting familiy level analyses, then the above procedure should be completed using the full sample weight TRIMWT, and the replicate weights TRIMWT1-TRIMWT24.

Conducting Child Level Point-In-Time Analyses

The complete sample for the 1994 National Study includes children and families who had open cases in the child welfare system on March 1, 1994, and all those children whose cases were open during the previous year and closed as of March 1, 1994. However, if comparisons are to be made between the 1994 National Study and the findings of the 1977 National Study (Schroeder and Shyne, 1980),

only the point-in-time (March 1994) data for the 1994 National Study can be used.

EXAMPLE 4.1: Obtaining Estimates, Standard Errors And Confidence Intervals Of Service Delivery At The Child Level

The following instructions demonstrate how to produce an estimate, standard error and confidence interval of the total number of children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994. This analysis will use the data file created with child level weights (TPRWT and TPRWT1-TPRWT24).

STEP 1. The first step is to specify the data that we would like to estimate. We would like to get an estimate of all children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994. We will therefore want an estimate of all children with a value of 1 for variable ANDISP. Select TABLES from the main menu and then choose NEW. Choose the appropriate data file and click on the OK button. Click on the SUBSET button and type ANDISP=1 in the center box. (Alternatively, the buttons in the lower portion of the screen may be double-clicked.) Once the subset is completed, click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. From this window click on the OUTPUT button to specify which output variables WesVarPC should produce. An example of useful output specifications could include the estimate, standard error, lower confidence interval and upper confidence interval. Click on the boxes next to these options in the VARIABLE NAMES box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.

STEP 2. The OPTIONS for the request must be specified at the lower left-hand portion of the table request window. To obtain a 95% confidence interval, ALPHA should be set at 0.05. The degrees of freedom must be specified. For the 1994 National Study data, the degrees of freedom value equals the number of replicates minus the number of parameters estimated. In the current example, DF=23 (because there are 24 replicates and one estimated parameter) If the degrees of freedom are omitted, WesVarPC sets the degrees of freedom to the default setting (infinite).

STEP 3. Save the table request by clicking on the SAVE button.

STEP 4. Run the table request by clicking on the RUN button. Once WesVarPC has finished calculating the estimate, click on the VIEW button to examine the output. The output for this request is shown in Table 4-1.

EXAMPLE 4.2: Obtaining Estimates Of Service Delivery At The Child Level For Eight Age Subgroups

The following instructions demonstrate how to produce estimates for eight age subgroups of children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994. This analysis will use the data file created with the child level weights (TPRWT and TPRWT1-TPRWT24.)

STEP 1. First the data must be recoded using the FORMAT menu. The variable AGEPCHLD must be recoded into the desired age subgroups. The new variable will be REC_AGE and will have the following values:

REC_AGE = 1 if AGEPCHLD < 1.

REC_AGE = 2 if AGEPCHLD = 1 or 2.

REC_AGE = 3 if AGEPCHLD = 3 or 4.

REC_AGE = 4 if AGEPCHLD = 5 or 6.

REC_AGE = 5 if AGEPCHLD = 7 or 8 or 9 or 10.

REC_AGE = 6 if AGEPCHLD = 11 or 12 or 13.

REC_AGE = 7 if AGEPCHLD = 14 or 15 or 16.

REC_AGE = 8 if AGEPCHLD = 17 or greater.

The instructions for this recoding are as follows:

Select FORMAT from the main menu and then choose RECODES. Choose the appropriate WesVarPC data file and click on the OK button. At the CREATE RECODES window, click on the DISCRETE button and at the next RECODE window click on the SELECT button. Click on the variable AGEPCHLD then hit the >> key to move the variable into the SELECTED box. Click the CLOSE button. The next window allows you to recode the AGEPCHLD variable. First click in the NEW VARIABLE NAME box and type in the variable name REC_AGE. Next, click on the value "0" to highlight it. Click in the NEW VALUE box and type 1. Hit the V to assign REC_AGE the new value of 1 when AGEPCHLD = 0. Repeat this process to complete the recoding of AGEPCHLD. Click CLOSE to return to the CREATE RECODES window and view the PENDING RECODE LIST. Click CREATE to complete the recode. WesVarPC then asks if you want to save over the current file or rename the file.

- STEP 2. Next it is necessary to subset the data according to cases which were open on March 1. Select TABLES from the main menu and then choose NEW. Choose the appropriate data file and click on the OK button. Click on the SUBSET button and type ANDISP=1 in the center box. Once the subset is completed, click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. From the TABLE REQUEST window, specify the data items that will be produced in the OUTPUT window, and specify the OPTIONS in the main TABLE REQUEST window (Alpha=0.05, Df=23).
- STEP 3. Click on the TABLES button, and then NEW. Double click on the REC_AGE variable to move it from the SOURCE VARIABLE box to the TABLE box. Click on the ">>" button to move the REC_AGE variable to the "selected" box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLES window and click on the CLOSE button again to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.
- **STEP 4.** SAVE the new table request and RUN the request. Some of the values obtained from the request for the total number of children receiving services on March 1, by subgroup, are shown in Table 4.2.

Example 4.3: Obtaining The Mean Age of Children Receiving Services

The following steps illustrate how to obtain the average age of children receiving services on March 1, 1994.

STEP 1. Open a new TABLES window and begin a table request. The data will need to be subset into those cases that were open on March 1, 1994. Additionally, the data must be limited to exclude those cases that had a missing value for age (AGEPCHLD = 98 or 99). These steps are accomplished by typing "ANDISP = 1 AND AGEPCHLD >= 0 AND AGEPCHLD <=21" in the SUBSET window. From the TABLE REQUEST window, specify the statistics that will be produced in the OUTPUT window, and specify the OPTIONS in the main TABLE REQUEST window (Alpha=0.01, Df=23).

STEP 2. Click on the ANALYSIS button and Click ANDISP into the SELECTED box. Close the Window to return to the main TABLE REQUEST window. Click on the COMPUTE button to calculate the rate of mean age of maltreatment. Name the mean age of maltreatment by typing "MEANAGE" in the left-hand portion of the COMPUTE STATISTIC box. Enter MEAN(AGEPCHLD) on the other side of the COMPUTE STATISTIC box. Move the entire equation to the SELECTED box by clicking on the >> button in the middle of the screen. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.

STEP 3. SAVE the new table request and RUN the request. A portion of the output is shown in Table 4.3. The mean age of children receiving services on March 1, 1994 was 8.48 years.

V. WESVAR PC EXAMPLES: FAMILY LEVEL POINT-IN-TIME ANALYSES

Example 5.1: Obtaining Family Level Estimates of Service Delivery

The following instructions demonstrate how to produce an estimate of the total number of families who were receiving food stamps and were receiving services on March 1, 1994. This analysis will use the data file created with the family level weights (TRIMWT and TRIMWT1-TRIMWT24).

STEP 1. The first step is to create a WesVarPC dataset that designates TRIMWT as the full sample weight and TRIMWT1-TRIMWT24 as the replicate weights. This can be done by completing the steps described in the section entitled *Importing the 1994 National Study File*.

STEP 2. The next step is to specify the data that we would like to estimate. We would like to get an estimate of all children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994. We will therefore want an estimate of all children with a value of 1 for variable ANDISP. Select TABLES from the main menu and then choose NEW. Choose the appropriate data file and click on the OK button. Click on the SUBSET button and type ANDISP=1 in the center box. (Alternatively, the buttons in the lower portion of the screen may be double-clicked.) Once the subset is completed, click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. From this window click on the OUTPUT button to specify which output variables WesVarPC should produce. Useful output specifications could include the estimate, standard error, lower confidence interval and upper confidence interval. Click on the boxes next to these options in the VARIABLE NAMES box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. Next click on the TABLES button. Click NEW and then double click on the variable D9A to move it to the TABLE box. Next click on the >> button to move the variable to the SELECTED box. Click CLOSE and then CLOSE again to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.

STEP 3. The OPTIONS for the request must be specified in the lower left-hand portion of the table request window. To obtain a 95% confidence interval, ALPHA should be set at 0.05. The degrees of freedom should be specified as 23. Save the table request by clicking on the SAVE button.

STEP 4. Run the table request by clicking on the RUN button. Once WesVarPC has finished calculating the estimate, click on the VIEW button to examine the output. The values obtained for this request for the number of families receiving food stamps and receiving services on March 1 are shown in Table 5.1.

Example 5.2: Obtaining Family Level Estimates of Housing Problems

The following instructions demonstrate how to produce an estimate of the total number of families who were facing eviction and were receiving services on March 1, 1994. This analysis will make use of the data file created with the family level set of weights: TRIMWT and TRIMWT1-TRIMWT24.

STEP 1. The first step is to specify the data that we would like to estimate. We would like to get an estimate of all children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994. We will therefore want an estimate of all children with a value of 1 for variable ANDISP. Select TABLES from the main menu and then choose NEW. Choose the appropriate data file and click on the OK button. Click on the SUBSET button and type ANDISP=1 in the center box. (Alternatively, the buttons in the lower portion of the screen may be double-clicked.) Once the subset is completed, click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. From this window click on the OUTPUT button to specify which output variables WesVarPC should produce. Useful output specifications could include the estimate, standard error, lower confidence interval and upper confidence interval. Click on the boxes next to these options in the VARIABLE NAMES box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. Next click on the TABLES button. Click NEW and then double click on the variable D14C to move it to the TABLE box and then >> to the SELECTED box. Click CLOSE and then CLOSE again to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.

STEP 2. The OPTIONS for the request must be specified. To obtain a 95% confidence interval, ALPHA would be set at 0.05 to specify the Type I error or the level of significance. The degrees of freedom must be specified as 23. Save the table request by clicking on the SAVE button.

STEP 3. Run the table request by clicking on the RUN button. Once WesVarPC has finished calculating the estimate, click on the VIEW button to examine the output. The values obtained for this request for the number of families facing eviction and receiving services on March 1 are shown in Table 5.3.

VI. WESVAR PC EXAMPLES: CHILD LEVEL YEARLY ESTIMATES OF SERVICE DELIVERY

To be able to draw comparisons to the 1977 National Study, it is necessary to use point-in-time data. However, these data are limited because children who have been served for longer periods are more likely to be included in the data while children who may move in and out of the system quickly are underrepresented in the data. To get an accurate picture of the child welfare population as a whole, it is essential to examine the characteristics of all children and families -- including those who enter and exit the system quickly. The 1994 National Study also provides annual data -- data on children and families served over a one year period.

Example 6.1 Obtaining Child Level Estimates of New Cases Served During The Year

The number of children who entered service delivery during the year from March 1, 1993 to February 28, 1994 are termed the annual admission cohort. The following example demonstrates how to get estimates of the admissions cohort in subgroups by length of time cases received services. This analysis will use the data file created with the child level weights (TPRWT and TPRWT1-TPRWT24).

STEP 1. The first step is to specify the data that we would like to estimate. We would like to get an estimate of all children who entered service during the year. We will therefore want an estimate of all children with a value of 1 for variable COHORT. Select "Tables" from the main menu and then choose NEW. Choose the appropriate data file and click on the OK button. Click on the SUBSET button and type COHORT=1 in the center box. (Alternatively, the buttons in the lower portion of the screen may be double-clicked.) Once the subset is completed, click on the COMPUTE button. In the left box type "Tentered" and in the right side box enter the variable COHORT. Click on the >> key to move the expression to the selected box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. Next click on the TABLES button. Click NEW and then double click on the variable COLENOP to move it to the "Table" box and then to the "Selected" box. Click CLOSE and then CLOSE again to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. Click on the OUTPUT button to specify which

output variables WesVarPC should produce. An example of useful output specifications could include the estimate, standard error, lower confidence interval and upper confidence interval. Click on the boxes next to these options in the VARIABLE NAMES box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.

STEP 2. The OPTIONS for the request must be specified. To obtain a 95% confidence interval, ALPHA would be set at 0.05. The degrees of freedom should be set to 23.

Save the table request by clicking on the SAVE button.

STEP 3. Run the table request by clicking on the RUN button. Once WesVarPC has finished calculating the estimate, click on the VIEW button to examine the output. The values obtained for this request for the total number of children who entered service delivery during the year from March 1, 1993 to February 28, 1994 are shown in Table 6.1.

Example 6.2. Obtaining Estimates of the Length of Time Children Were Receiving services

The variable DURGROUP divides the cases into three categories according to the length of time they were served. The following instructions demonstrate how to get estimates of the number of children in each DURGROUP category. For this analysis, the entire annual sample was used, those cases open on March 1, 1994 and those cases which closed during the prior year. This analysis will use the data file created with the child level weights (TPRWT and TPRWT1-TPRWT24).

STEP 1. The first step is to specify the data that we would like to estimate. We would like to get an estimate of all children who were receiving services on March 1, 1994 and those cases which closed during the prior year. We will therefore want an estimate of all children with a value of 1 or 2 for variable ANDISP. Select TABLES from the main menu and then choose NEW. Choose the appropriate data file and click on the OK button. Click on the SUBSET button and type ANDISP=1 or ANDISP=2 in the center box. (Alternatively, the buttons in the lower portion of the screen may be double-clicked.) Once the subset is completed, click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. Next click on the TABLES button. Click NEW and then double click on the variable DURGROUP to move it to the "Table" box and then to the "selected" box. Click CLOSE and then CLOSE again to return to the TABLE REQUEST window. From this window click on the OUTPUT button to specify which output variables WesVarPC should produce. Useful output specifications could include the estimate, standard error, lower confidence interval and upper confidence interval. Click on the boxes next to these options in the VARIABLE NAMES box. Click on the CLOSE button to return to the TABLE REQUEST window.

STEP 2. The OPTIONS for the request must be specified. To obtain a 95% confidence interval, ALPHA would be set at 0.05. The degrees of freedom should be set to 23. Save the table request by clicking on the SAVE button.

STEP 3. Run the table request by clicking on the RUN button. Once WesVarPC has finished calculating the estimate, click on the VIEW button to examine the output. The values obtained for this request for the total number of children receiving services in each duration category are shown in Table 6.2.
